Reunion '88

WHEN: July 25, 26, and 27, 1988 (Plan to arrive the 24th).

The second item delaying us was an attempt on our part to pull the City of Columbus, Georgia's leasing agreements kicking and screaming into the 20th Century. As a result of my meeting with the Committee last week, the matter is going before the City Attorney for an opinion. The final word on that will be forthcoming during January and we will lock down all the details for the reunion in the first quarter newsletter for 1988. You will also be presented a slate of potential Officers and Directors to be elected during July 1988 in the newsletter.

As a general outline of the currently scheduled events you can plan on being brought to Fort Benning, by Army Bus, the morning of 25 July. Our first stop will be Marshall at Auditorium, The Infantry School where you and your families will be treated to a short but excellent history of the American Infantry. Across the street at Eubanks Field you will have an hour long demonstration of Airborne in Action, courtesy of the 1st Bn, 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment which some of you knew as the Airborne School previously.

For those who trained elsewhere and never enjoyed the Airborne's 250' Towers, we have the controlled tower on tap. This is the fun ride they had at the New York World's Fair in 1940. If you missed it then (smile) you are getting it now. It is a safe ride for your family and yourself. In addition, we have the 34' tower laid on for the old, bold jumpers. This is also a chance . . . for you to qualify some of your former team buddies who never had the opportunity to go to Jump School, but didn't let that deter them from joining the 75th Rangers and sharing the common dangers of patrolling in Vietnam. You will find a photo of those two delightful devices elsewhere in this issue of **Patrolling**.

We continue to receive donations from individuals and I did overlook one of them in our last edition. We were not even soliciting a donation for it at the time and casually mentioned that it is our intent to either get a monument to the Long Range Patrol (Airborne) placed on the Airborne Memorial Walk at Fort Benning or have a completely separate one designed and built. Immediately, BOB WIMMER, a 75th Ranger from 'Nam sent in \$50.00 toward that end. We would like all of you to hold off on that issue for now. We can take it up at our business meeting and elections on the morning of July 27, 1988.

Following the Airborne in Action we will move over to the 75th Ranger Regiment monument we had erected at the Airborne Walk. It was designed for the Rangers from both Vietnam and Grenada. You cannot help but be impressed with the simple beauty of the overall Airborne Walk itself. After your photo taking sessions there we will move a block or so to the Main NCO Club for lunch.

A decision is being made this month to keep or move the day for Rangers in Action demonstrations from Tuesday to Monday. If the date is changed we will move straight to Victory Pond, Fort Benning where you will be entertained with a fast paced demonstration series by the Ranger Training Brigade (formerly U.S. Army Ranger Department) for approximately forty-five minutes. Here you will see the highlights of Ranger Training demonstrated. You will come away from this demonstration with an understanding of why the Soldier wearing the Black and Gold tab of a U.S. Army Ranger is sought after, Army wide for their small unit leadership abilities.

You who departed the Army following Vietnam, will learn that many of your former team members, who were not Ranger School trained, have gone through that training and many became instructors at the Ranger School. They now hold key positions in the Regiment and other units at the School, around the Infantry Center and world.

Taps

September 25, 1987 Sergeant Frank D. Winters, Company C, 1st Bn, 75th Ranger Regiment, was killed and seven other Rangers injured in a training accident at Fort Bragg, NC, when the MH-53 Helicopter USAF they were about to descend from "tilted" throwing the Rangers off of the ramp to the ground. Sgt Winters was from the West Palm Beach/Boynton Beach area of Florida.

Although we learned about the accident too late for Florida services, Dan Roberts F/58th LRP and L/75th contacted Mrs. Winters personally. At Fort Bragg services for Sgt Winters, Roy Boatman 74th Inf Det LRP and N/75th represented the association. His former Commander LTC Dick James (Ret) was the association representative at Arlington National Cemetery that same day, October 5, 1987. James commanded the 74th Inf LRP when it was converted to N/75th Rangers.

Some of us may recall a team of Rangers being flung from a UH-1 on short final after it lost its tail rotor at about 60' during the Company Raid into the Ashau Valley during March 1971 led by (then) Cpt Bob Guy, L/75th. Think of a baseball being hit by a bat and you'll know how the Lima Rangers felt when the Huey boom belted them at that altitude. Guy made 0-6 on October 1, 1987. When his Eagles for a full Colonel were being pinned on an Earthquake rumbled through the Southern California Campus where his son attends College. Now we know the Rangers operate in strange ways, but an Earthquake! No slack!

Treasurer's Report

Because we are mailing to a number of individuals and active duty units who do not have a need to know, Nick Gibbone's report has been edited for your consumption here. A full report concerning Association Finances will be forthcoming to members during the 1988 reunion business meeting. This abbreviated report commences with the closing of our "first ever" combined reunion at Fort Campbell, KY during June 1986 through June 30. 1987.

First, those monies collected at the reunion and presented to Don Lynch to continue providing and mailing a quarterly newsletter were turned over to Bob Gilbert following the establishment of the Association account and Chartering of the 75th Regimental Association.

Secondly, those Long Range Patrol and 75th Ranger Veterans who contributed funds to repay Bob for his layout of funds for the 75th Ranger Monument and the Airborne Walk had that money rolled over into the Association account, to establish it. The combined monies became the seed money for ordering membership cards, stationary, and your newsletter, **PATROLLING.** We began with the Assn. in the black, financially.

During the past calendar year we have provided you members with four newsletters. The labor (from us) is free however, the newsletter and mailing it at third class bulk mail rates costs us money each quarter. addition we are providing In gratuitous copies of the newsletters to the Ranger Regiment and the Ranger Training Brigade (Ranger School). Former LRP and Rangers in numbers far 75th our membership have exceeding received gratuitous copies also. If they choose not to HOOKUP, THIS IS THEIR FINAL NEWSLETTER.

We have and will continue to, at least temporarily, provide a newsletter for those who are unfortunate enough to be caught up in nationwide layoffs. We recognize those as (usually) a temporary situation and do not think your buddies, past or present would like us to take the "Cheap Charlie" route with you.

Finally, we provide just a few gratuitous copies to some interesting people we will tell you about during the business meeting. To summarize, we are in the black financially at the end of the first (actual) year. At this writing our finances are improving with the increase in membership and renewals.

Ranger Training Brigade

On December 2, 1987 the U.S. Army Ranger Department became history. Colonel James E. Mace, former Commander of the 2nd Bn (Ranger) 75th Infantry, assumed duties as Director, Ranger Department during June 87. He is currently the first Commander for the Ranger Training Brigade, a type training to organization whose coming fruition was overdue and involved a lot of work manv

lot of hard work by many individuals within and without the (former) Ranger Department. Mace, a native of South Carolina, is a graduate of the Citadel, having received Baccalaureate and Masters degrees there. A winner of the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star and numerous other decorations and awards, Colonel Mace is said to be an avid hunter. Rumor control holds that anything landing in the vicinity of Colonel Mace while hunting was indeed downed by him.

On 15 June 1987 Sergeant Major Fred Weekley assumed duties as the Ranger Department Sergeant Major, arriving from similar duties at the former Florida Ranger Camp. A native of Iowa, Weekley served for 29 months in Vietnam with companies D and F (Ranger) 75th Infantry. He also served as an advisor to the Vietnamese Airborne. Weekley holds an Associate of Science Degree in General Management from El Paso Community College and is a graduate of class 26 US Army Sergeants Major Academy. Weekly won the Silver Star among numerous other awards and decorations.

Looney Says We Are Not Crazy

So Why Do I Feel So Miserable?

What do we want out of life and what are we doing to get it? Are you getting what you want out of life? At age 40, I am asking myself, "Is that all there is?"

Within each person, there is a conflict between wanting to cooperate with others (loving and sharing) and controlling others (making them do what is best). How do we keep others from hurting us and make them please us? How do I get my boss to recognize I deserve a raise? How do I get what I want?

We learned from birth that anger can get us what we want. An infant will cry, scream and get red in the to capture an adult's face attention. Then adults try all kinds of things to stop the infant from crying. Adults are more powerful and they change the infant's environment (change its diaper and feed it). Great stuff for an infant. As we grew older, we found out anger did not always

work. So we learned other ways to get what we wanted.

Misery was one of the most successful behaviors we learned as children of five years old. It got those powerful adults to ask what was wrong and if they could help. They would not only change our environment buy they would console us and say, "That is okay. It will be all right." Those are great words for adults as well as children.

We as adults still use what we learned as children to get what we want but there is a terrible price to pay for being **angry** and **miserable.** So how do I change my behavior to get my wants, needs and desires?

Dr. William Glasser's book, <u>Control Theory</u>, on which this article is based, describes four categories of behavior:

1. **Doing** (action, moving your body).

Thinking (generating thought).

3. Feelings (emotions; pain,

pleasure).

Physiological (sweating, clammy hands).

Of these four, Dr. Glasser says the easiest to change is Doing. I agree and suggest if you change one, the other three will follow. For instance, if I find myself being miserable (sitting in the basement, shutting the blinds, not answering the phone and just not wanting to be with anyone) and it is not getting me what I want, then I can change what I am doing. I can go fishing, visit a friend, cut the grass, jog, work on the car or play with the kids. If I stop being miserable by changing what I am doing, then in time I will feel better. Thinking, Feelings, and Physiology will eventually change as the Doing changes. As AA says, "Fake it until you make it."

Rather than waiting for my wife to offer to change my environment and make me happy because I am miserable, I need to do something for myself. I need to say, "What do I want and what do I need to do to

get it, rather than what do I want and who can do it for me?" It is nice to know that I am a powerful adult who can control my own **Doing**, **Thinking**, Feeling and Physiology.

Back to mγ raise, after struggling with different manipulations (getting angry and being miserable) I might decide that my boss is either very dumb or I cannot control his behavior. All right, I give up the notion I can control people. I cannot make my boss, or anyone else do anything they do not want to do. But I can ask my boss what can I do differently to qualify for a raise. Curiously, when I change my behavior, the possibilities are endless. And isn't it a good feeling to know with all the things going out of control in this world you can control your own behavior. And you don't have to control all those other people.

A personal note, I would like to thank Bob Gilbert for inviting me to write this column. It has given

with an NVA force of unknown size. during which time he earned the Silver Star, escaped and evaded to an Air Cavalry Troop with Dustoff Co-Pilot Roger Madison, a Redleg who now flies choppers for the Navy off of an Aircraft Carrier in the Pacific, and a team member named McAlpine. This team suffered the only known MIA and POW from the 75th (Ranger) Infantry. Before medevac of team leader Duren an UH-1 inserted SSG Vodden to replace him. The UH-1 was blown about 300 yards down the mountain by NVA fires after Vodden leaped from the skid. Only one door gunner survived. The dustoff flown by CWO Fred Behrens was shot down after its second flight into the same LZ, without gunship cover. According to Madison, Behrens executed a flawless autorotation into the LZ as enemy fire ripped into his body. Lieutenant Commander Roger Madison, an old Redleg, and dustoff Pilot will be at our July reunion. Y'all come. Heah?
