Special guests were Ranger advisors to the South Vietnamese Ranger Battalions representing the 32nd, 41st, and 42nd Vietnamese Ranger Battalions. We had two of our Red Cross ladies, a USAF Captain, and Eagle Dustoff 913 Fred Behrens who was presented an honorary Combat Infantryman's Badge by the Ranger and LRP members for his air and ground combat prowess between April 23-25, 1971, in the Ashau Valley of Vietnam fighting for and with a Ranger Team.

Menu for the Barbecue: There were 226 people in attendance, who were served BBQ chicken and pork, potato salad, cole slaw, Brunswick stew, baked beans, corn on the cob, French fries, bread and butter, iced tea or coffee, and watermelon. They also went through three kegs of beer and 152 soft drinks.

Menu for the Banquet: There were 216 people in attendance, who were served 12 oz beef tenderloin (140), boneless breast of chicken topped with Supreme Sauce on Holland Rusk (65), and eleven other meals consumed by walk-ins we didn't expect but were fortunate enough to have planned for with an overage allowance. The meals also included baked potatoes with sour cream and chives, green beans almondine, rolls and butter, coffee and tea, and peach cobbler. Cash bars were open during the banquet. We presume everyone enjoyed their meals since no complaints were noted.

Entertainment: Following the BBQ meal a country and western band took off and we learned how the cowboys used to kick buffalo chips around campfires 100 or so years ago watching some of the folks dance. Following the banquet the Rangers, Lurps, families and guests were treated to some versatile professional entertainers, "The Works," featuring Pam and Donny Gaudreau.

Folks we are looking to double not only the membership by 1990 but double the attendance at the next reunion. Hook up!



Association Update

Geoffrey T. Barker, President of the John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Memorial and Museum Association and author of A Concise History of Special Operations Forces, contacted Bob Gilbert prior to the 75th Ranger's first national reunion. As a result of that contact two things have occurred.

First, Barker was able to learn about the LRP and 75th Ranger Medal of Honor awardees and include them in his book as it went into print.

Secondly, he went to the JFKSWM&MA Council with a proposal. On October 11, the 75th Ranger Regiment Association was unanimously accepted by that Council as ex-officio honorary member with a place on their Council.

Billy Nix, Association President, has moved to fill that position with one of the four original founders of our organization who will appoint an alternate. Both have Special Forces backgrounds and know their way around Smoke Bomb Hill at Ft. Bragg.

One objective of that Council is to build a memorial museum in honor of Arthur D. "Bull" Simons, a legend as a Soldier and civilian in Ranger and Special Operations. Geoff Barker, a former British Paratrooper and retired U.S. Army Lieutenant Colonel has an extensive background in Special Operations. He has initiated a couple of things on our behalf already. SSG Pruden, a Team Leader in G/75th at the time, was the second of two soldiers who earned the Medal of Honor while serving in a Ranger unit. We were delighted to have Pruden's parents, his brother, a nephew, and sister-in-law as guests during our first national reunion. They very graciously allowed us to display Robert Pruden's Medal of Honor along with those of Robert D. Law, the first soldier to ever win the Medal of Honor while serving in a U.S. Army Ranger Company, and Laszlo Rabel, the only member of the Long Range Patrol who ever won the Medal of Honor.

Okay you guys from E/51st and G/75th, here is your opportunity to let those Long Range Surveillance Company members learn, first hand, via letters, photos, etc. of your experiences. You can especially be a source of combat tips for them and hope they never have to use the advice.

We and the Army should consider the Long Range Surveillance element of the Ranger Training Brigade at Fort Benning extremely fortunate because they have one Sergeant, Bill Wilkinson, as a trainer for the Long Range Surveillance students.
