

TO: RANGER ROY BOATMAN

I read President Bob Gilbert's article in the October issue of Static Line concerning tabbed Rangers vs Scroll Rangers. I'd like to say that I am proud to be accepted into the 75th Ranger Regiment Association, I'm also grateful for its existence. You see I was in 2nd Bn. before I was hurt in a vehicle accident which broke my back leaving me paralyzed from the waist down. I never got the chance to attend Ranger School or even prove myself in combat. But does this mean I am not a RANGER? I graduated from RIP and earned the right to not only wear but bear the black beret and the 2nd Bn. scroll! If it was not for the blood sweat and tears I went through to earn my beret and scroll, I don't think I would have been able to cope with my injury. Doctors told me that I wouldn't walk again. But does this mean that I wouldn't? Wrong answer! I can walk now with the aide of braces. It took every thing I've learned and believed in (the beret, scroll, and Ranger Creed) to take this injury and turn it around into just another challenge. Yes sir, I tried reaching out to another association but, NO TAB ... NO GO. It's not easy out here in this leg-civilian world where people don't understand the "Ranger Mind". I have trouble dealing with able bodied people that think they have problems when they stub their toe. Hell I can't feel mine, and that can be advantageous at times. I've got problems with the guys on my wheel chair basketball team not accepting my RANGER character, and we're suppose to be a team? They don't know about being on a team! I read in PATROLLING where a Ranger crossed that line and went to "the other side". He said, "It's suppose to be nice on the other side*. Yeah, I believe that too! To die in combat was my dream, thats the only way I wanted to go. Maybe that's why the "THE BIG RANGER IN THE SKY* slapped me in the face to show me how precious life really is. It hurts to see a brother Ranger take his own. A brother that knows what it's like to be on a team! A brother that won't leave you behind in a time of need. I volunteer to be here for any Ranger brother that has a problem, whatever it may be

I write to you as new member of the 75th Ranger Regiment Association. I started to read this months PATROLLING today and it brought back some tear filled memories. I was paralyzed from the mid section of my chest down on the initial assualt on Rio Hato, Panama. Due to two parachute collisions my canopy collapsed resulting in an impact which crushed my spine from the thoracic vertabrea 7 down. The memory of that pain filled night swept over me like they never have as I read the story about the 3rd Bn Ranger who was helped so much by Ross Perot. I caught myself trying to shake the memories of the tracer filled sky. It hurts to dream of a life that passed in C/2/75th, waking up in the mornings expecting to see my old roommate Kennedy in the bunk beside me. I miss that life! Life does not really start until you've donned the coveted black beret. It has taken a lot of tears and the help of some Viet Nam Veterans to see purpose in life again. No organization or calling has made me feel so whole as our assocition has, except for my wife, Renee. Mr. Ross Perot has had a hand, through he probably doesn't know it, indirectly in my rehab. I don't know how many times I've called him, yet as busy as he is he always has time to say hello. He visited me during my initial hospitalization in which he made a lasting impression. My only regret during my time in Battalion is that I was never allowed the opportunity to win the coveted black and gold Ranger tab. Many people try and justify and tell me I won it the hard way, others tell me I shouldn't

worry about a 59 cent patch that I could buy in an Army/Navy surplus store. Seems petty to most I'm sure, but it has left a hole in my heart. I will always ponder the question, could I have done it? After in the Ranger community for over 13 months, where I resided as a 60mm mortar gunner, the two most important things in life are preparing for war and Ranger School. It's easy to feel that I did not complete but half my personal and spiritial Ranger mission. I would like to recruit your aide in locating two Rangers. The first I met at Wilfred Hall hospital at Lackland AFB during my initial hospitalization. He was wounded, I believe, by a grenade used for clearing a building. His wounds were to his abdomen. The last rememberance I have of this Ranger was that he snuck me a chew of Copenhagen. Please, if you are out there write me and let me know who you are. Secondly, I would like to hear from a Viet Nam era Ranger whom I met at the Wall last memorial day. He will remember me because I was the young Ranger in the wheelchair sitting on the panel next to General Collin Powell as he made his memoriable speech. This Ranger is a christian and has grey hair as well as a beard and mustach. I would like to close with this: Rangers of all era, I know your pain and I empathize with you. I share the memories good and bad. There is no stronger family than the one known as the 75th Rangers. I would also like to hear some of the stories from the Grenada and Panama operations, so I ask that all you HOOAAH's out there send in your stories so PATROLLING can publish them. EDITORS COMMENT: Rangers helping Rangers does not stop with the end of a war or mission. It continues as a responsibility that we all share. The two letters above show the effect of our helping in any way we can.

TO: LUKE FERGUSON, DUKE DUSHANE, GARY NORTON, MIKE ROSSI, AND FELLOW RANGERS It's time that I write this letter and let you all know about the man who saved my life in RVN on 21 Dec 1969, I know that Luke Ferguson and Duke DuShane know most of the story but, I feel I must tell it from my point of view. To begin with I must say it's a honor to have served with the men of P/75 and to have been commanded by a man like Luke Ferguson. I was proud to be a member of "Dowds Dirty Half Dozen", you gave us that name Duke when you were our ATL, before you got your own team. The half dozen took off for a mission in the Dong Be Loa mountain area, up at the tri border area of Laos, North and South Vietnam, Cpt. Ferguson was in the CC chopper overhead for the insertion. As we approached the LZ we were hit

from both sides by 51 cal fire. The chopper went down in flames and crashed into the mountain side, killing 8 of the 10 men aboard (one of the door gunners was to die later) leaving me the only one Several reasons; 1. Divine to survive, WHY? intervention - God has a plan for me, a plan that I'm still searching for, but one I will eventually find. 2. I lived because of my commander (Luke Ferguson). When he saw the insertion aircraft crash, he knew he had to help his people. He forced the pilot of his aircraft to land at the crash sight, where he jumped out (unarmed) and went to the aide of his men while the CC ship circled overhead. He checked the pulse of each man, finding none alive when he heard me moan from inside the wreckage, disregarding the fact that there was fuel all over the place and the chopper could blow at any minute and that the NVA were no doubt on the way to the crash sight. He untangled me and and held on to me as the CC ship came back in to extract us. I don't know what Lukes thoughts were, but God Bless you Luke Ferguson, you stayed with your Rangers. If any person personifies the word "RANGER" it would be Luke Ferguson, his actions to help his men shows just what the term Ranger means. I thank you and salute your bravery. If it wasn't for him, I wouldn't have four wonderful children. I want to thank PaPa Duke, Gary Norton, and Mike Rossi for all the support you have given me over the years. I also appreciate Duke staying at the hospital ship while I was operated on, subconscienously I knew you were there and I was not alone, giving me the support I needed to live. Darby.

Nothing is more powerful than an idea whose time has come, and in the Army today the Ranger idea has reached its zenith in prestige and priorities in fulfillment of General Darby's dream for permanent Ranger forces. As the pioneers of this idea, the RBA WW II, is proud of the outstanding military accomplishments of all Rangers of all wars in the 20th Century. Thus the 50th Anniversary program will honor all Ranger combat units, and all Rangers who wear the coveted Tab as well.

Thanks to the splendid support and enthusiastic cooperation of the 75th Ranger Regiment commanded by Colonel David L. Grange, the Ranger Training Brigade, commanded by Colonel John Maher, the Merrill's Marauders Association, the Rangers Airborne Companies of the Korean War, the LRRP & LRP 75th Ranger Inf. Companies of the Vietnam War, the RBA WW II Commemoration Committee is proud to announce the following highlights:

June 19th: COMMEMORATIVE AND MEMORIAL CEREMONIES will include a march past of all veterans present of all wars and all operations led by the survivors of the 1st Ranger Battalion who were present at the June 19th, 1942 activation at Carrickfergus, N. Ireland and followed by the entire 3 Battalions of the 75th Ranger Regiment and current staff and candidates of the Ranger Training Brigade. Guests of Honor invited include the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Army, the Chief of Staff, Commander of Infantry Center, Commander of the Army Special Operations and many other military and civilian dignitaries, including Henry Brown, General Secretary of the Commando Association. 

OFFICE OF PRESIDENT

Roy Nelson E/50 LRP has volunteered to run for the office of President (1992 - 1994). In the interest of the members who cannot attend this years Reunion and General Membership meeting the following information is provided: Roy was the First Sergeant of E/50th LRP and a Korean Veteran with the 187th Abn Regimental Combat Team. During August of 1967, the unit was stretched thin from missions assigned by higher HQ's. The unit received a mission to recon a area recently swept by one of the Battalions. With no team leader available Roy Nelson volunteered as the Team Leader. During the recon of the 5X5 click area while a heavy downpour was occuring two NVA/VC were spotted sitting under their ponchos their backs to a tree. Through the heavy fog that had developed from the rain, the team backed away in a circle and then determined that they were in the midst of a base camp three hundred by five hundred meters. During the next hour the team reconned the entire area going from bunker to bunker. Using the trench system the NVA/VC had dug, the team exfiltrated the area without detection. Heading for a LZ that was named JFK because of its size (4 X 4 Kilometers) the team was extracted. Upon debriefing a Staff officer stated "You LURP's are always bringing in Bullshit like that. There is no one there the 1st Brigade just swept that AO." Astounded at the disbelief, Roy Nelson said, " Sir, I'll bet my stripes on it!" The officer responded, "How many you got Sarge"? Roy responded, "I'm Master Seargeant Roy Nelson, the First Sergeant." Roy then drew a detailed description of the camp. An ARC LIGHT mission (B-52's) was diverted from another mission. The results of the ARC LIGHT revealed 70 dead NVA, 65 bunkers destroyed, hundreds of weapons AK's, RPG's Mortars and thousands of rounds of ammunition were captured or destroyed. The 11th ACR killed 30 more during the three day sweep of the area. Roy learned his lessons while assigned to the 187th ARCT in Korea from the veterans of WWII, polished his skills with Special Forces, and when called on to lead a patrol led the patrol with the tenacity and expertise expected from the Team Leaders of all Long Range Patrols in RVN.

OFFICE OF VICE-PRESIDENT

Milton "Davey Crockett" Lockett served in the original Long Range Reconnaissance Patrol element of the Big Red One... 1st Infantry Division before being taken to Division HQ's as a personal body guard for General DePuy. After his first tour in RVN, Davey returned to the Army Ranger School where he was an instructor C of the former Benning Ranger Committee and NCOIC from 1968 until his retirement in 1972. In between he squeezed in another tour with F/58 LRP and L/75.
