REUNION REPORT

The 1996 75th Ranger Regiment Association Reunion in Tacoma and Ft Lewis, Washington, during the period June 19-22 was a great success mostly because of the "Red Carpet" treatment provided by the 2nd Ranger Battalion to the Rangers who attended the event. Most arrived on Tuesday, the 18th, but we had Rangers arriving from the Association each day of the Reunion. Each day had it's highlights and I will try to briefly cover them in this limited space. On Wednesday, we were treated to a Mass Jump by the 2nd Battalion, which was done with Mt. Ranier in the background. The weather was great as the C-141's flew over the drop zone and dropped the Rangers from the 2nd Battalion. Prior to the jump, there were several static displays set up to allow us to see the different equipment and weapons the Rangers are using now. After the jump, the LRSU Unit at Ft. Lewis inserted a team by Huey in front of the viewing area. It brought back memories for many of us who had done this a few times before ourselves. The men from the 2nd Bn. left the drop zone and spent time with those of us in attendance, answering questions, etc., and generally making us feel welcome on their "stomping grounds". Many of their friends and families were on hand to witness this event also. On Thursday, the 2nd Bn. had its Banner Day activities to find out which Company would have the right to be the Banner Company for the Battalion for the coming year. There were boxing "smokers", flag football, basketball, softball, volleyball, a tug of war, and "combatives", which are a form of hand to hand where actual blows are not struck, but submission holds are the norm. The highlight of this day was the opportunity for all the "old Rangers", their wives, girlfriends, and children, to fire most of the weapons the Rangers are using today. Several stations were set up at the range and we were broken down into groups and given the chance to actually fire these weapons. The Gustov, a shoulder fired, 84mm anti-armor weapon was very popular, and made the LAW we used seem like a popgun. Several fired this weapon and it got quite a bit of attention, since it sounded like a 155mm when it went off. The "old reliable" LAW was also available. The Mark 19, a 40mm machine gun (rate of fire, 360 rounds per minute), mounted on a HUMVEE was also

available, as was the 240G, a 7.62mm machine gun that is replacing the M60. The M249, commonly known as a SAW, a 5.56mm Squad Automatic Rifle was also there for our entertainment. Many of us found the CAR-15, the M-203 (over and under M-16/40mm grenade launcher), and the familiar M16, to be "just what the doctor ordered", although we all knew we could have found a use for the new weapons in Vietnam. The Beretta 9mm M9 has replaced the .45 we used, and we had the chance to fire it also. We were also treated to a chance to see and use the new NOD's (night observation devices) in the auditorium, near the Battalion area. A collage of photos from each Ranger and LRRP Company, put together and framed by Tom Sove, was presented to the members of the 2nd Battalion by our Association Officers during the awards ceremony after the Banner Day activities. The 2nd Battalion has decided to put this in their Mess Hall, where we had several great meals, so it may be seen each day by the active duty Rangers to remind them of their heritage. Friday was the Battalion Change of Command Ceremony, where outgoing Commander, LTC Stanley McChrystal, turned over the Battalion to LTC Michael Bednarek. Col. William Leszczynski and CSM Ponder were in attendance from the Regimental Headquarters at Ft. Benning, Ga., in addition to many other dignitaries. The Battalion was formed and Passed in Review after the appropriate comments had been made. LTC McChrystal, will be going to Harvard to study for a year, after which he is slated to assume command of the Regiment from Col. Leszczynski in 1997. Saturday started with our Business Meeting where the new officers who will guide the Association for the next two years were elected. Richard Ehrler (E/50th LRP), who was the Vice President, was elected President, and will lead us for the next two years. Terry Roderick, the former P/75th Unit Director, was elected Vice President. Tom Sove, former K/75th Unit Director, will be the Secretary for the next two years, and C. Larry Rhodes, D/151st, will remain as the Treasurer. A "HUGE THANK YOU" goes out to "The Roy Boys", Barley and Boatman, who have done such an exceptional job for the Association. Roy Boatman has been the Secretary for a very long time and was never able to relinquish the job, since no one else was crazy

enough to run for this very busy job before. It is a huge responsibility, and the Association owes him a debt of gratitude for a "job well done!!" Roy Barley's leadership has been exceptional for the past two years, and he will continue to assist the current leadership as needed. He is still "ramrodding the procurement of the Ranger Tab" for the membership, and will serve as our Quartermaster, for those of you who wish to purchase any of the items listed in the newsletter. In addition, we now have 8 new Unit Directors, and they are listed on the back page of the newsletter, as usual. Good luck to these men. Please "Support Your Local Unit Director, as this is a very important job within the Association, and a lot of time, expense and hard work goes into the job. Saturday's big event was the Banquet, where our guest speaker was MG John J. Maher, the Commanding Officer of the 25th Inf. Div., based in Hawaii. Gen. Maher entertained us with a speech about leadership, and had selected Rangers from the audience participate by recounting experiences they had, where another Ranger provided them leadership that made a difference in their life. The 2nd Battalion provided a very impressive group of Rangers for the Color Guard, and they performed flawlessly during the "Flag" and "Fallen Comrades" Ceremonies. The Guest of Honor, Issako Malo, from L/75th and the only Ranger ever captured by the NVA in Vietnam and returned, was finally reunited with his former Team Leader, Marvin Duren, and a fine time was had by all. Issako was captured in the same action where Ranger James Champion became MIA, and was hip shot and immobilized during a 4 day battle with large force of NVA in April, 1971. Issako was marched for 45 days by the NVA to a prison camp in North Vietnam, and was held for two years before he was finally released with a group of about 200 U.S. servicemen. He was asked how he was able to march with a bullet in his hip and replied, "they would have killed me if I hadn't kept moving." True Ranger Spirit!! He and his family now reside in the Tacoma area. There was music and dancing by many after the dinner. Sunday found most of us departing and the time flew by too quickly. I would be remiss if I didn't mention the great evenings at the LaQuinta Hotel with the young Rangers from 2nd Battalion. A lot of beer was consumed by us all, but there was a lot of participation by these young warriors, and everyone seemed to enjoy their company. There was a large contingent each evening and many new friendships made. This is one of the reasons we have the Reunions, in addition to seeing our old Ranger buddies from Vietnam. The weather was perfect the entire time we were there. CPT. Dan Wilson, the Bn. S-5, deserves a HUGE pat on the back for putting so much together for us, and getting us to the right places, at the right times, etc. He was a gracious host and always had a smile on his face as he directed us. In addition to him, the entire 2nd Battalion can be very proud of their performance while we were there. They really put themselves out for us and it was an experience that those of us in attendance will not forget. We look forward to returning to the Northwest and enjoying their hospitality in the future. **TERRY RODERICK VP**

All Rangers attending, including the current active duty F/51st LRS, punched in his wings for a little emphasis on "Airborne Ranger". OPERATION OVERLORD '97
ENGLAND - NORMANY - PARIS
JUNE 2 - 11, 1997

Operation Overlord '97 will be the first - and most likely the last organized opportunity for World War II and succeeding generations of Rangers to muster en masse at Dieppe, atop Pointe du Hoc and on Omaha Beach, where Major General (then Brigadier General) Norman D. Cota, Assistant Division Commander, 29th Infantry Division, issued his famous charge: 'Lead the way (off the beach), Rangers!'. Since that crucial moment on D-Day, when General Cota and US Army Rangers inspired pinned-down elements of the 29th Infantry Division to assault the heavily defended bluffs above 'Blood' Omaha, the battle cry of all US Army Rangers has been, "Rangers Lead the Way. Operation Overlord '97 will be a pilgrimage of historical significance. It will be a gathering of US Army Rangers. It will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for US Army Rangers of World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Southeast Asia, Dominican Republic, Lebanon Grenada, Panama, the Persian Gulf and Somalia - - and Commandos of the United Kingdom and France - - to celebrate our singularly rich customs and traditions. Importantly, it will provide time for younger Rangers to reflect on the operational and historical lessons - - while absorbing the spirit - - of our world War II Rangers. In a solemn torchlight ceremony to be held on the heights of Pointe du Hoc at sunrise on June 6, World War II Rangers, as a symbolic extension of their legacy, will pass the flame through succeeding generations of Rangers. Here and on nearby Omaha beach 53 years ago, US Army Rangers, at great human cost, scaled heavily defended, 100 - foot bluffs to begin their role in the liberation of Europe. Additional points of historic interest to US Army Rangers will include Dieppe, all the invasion beaches, Ste. Mere Eglise, the Rangers Museum at Grandcamp and important museums and local battlefields where Rangers and paratroopers of the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions spearheaded the D-Day invasion. In remembrance of the American soldiers, sailors and airmen who fought and fell in Normandy, Rangers will participate in special D-Day ceremonies at the exquisite Normandy American Cemetery. The pilgrimage will conclude in Paris at the Arc de Triomphe with a wreath laying ceremony by the tomb of the 'unknown Soldier'. Embracing all Ranger eras and units, the following Ranger organizations will participate in Operation Overlord '97: Ranger Battalions Association of World War II, The William O. Darby Foundation, Merrill's Marauders Association, Ranger Infantry Companies (Airborne) of the Korean War, 75th Ranger Regiment Association and the US Army Ranger Association. US Army Rangers who may be unaffiliated with an officially recognized US Army Ranger organization are warmly invited and sincerely encouraged to make the pilgrimage. As Operation Overlord '97 is a pilgrimage of and for US Army Rangers of all eras and units - - and their guests - - please verify eligibility by contacting the **US Army Ranger Association, Box 341, Gordon, GA 31031-0341**. Through official records or membership in an officially recognized US Army Ranger organization, the US Army Ranger Association will verify the

eligibility of each pilgrim. *NOTE: Planning on this trip is going on daily to ensure that the Rangers going will have a very enjoyable time. The projected cost will be around \$2000.00 per person, a brochure and other info should be available as of this newsletter. Please contact:*

The Ranger Hall of Fame was formed to honor and preserve the spirit and contributions of America's most extraordinary Rangers. The members of the Ranger Hall of Fame Selection Board take particular care to ensure that only the most extraordinary Rangers are inducted, a difficult mission given the high caliber of all nominees. Their precepts are impartiality, fairness, and scrutiny. Inductees were selected impartially from Ranger units and associations representing each era of Ranger history. Each nominee was subjected to the scrutiny of the Selection Board to ensure the most extraordinary contributions are acknowledged. Selection criteria is as unique as our Ranger history. To be eligible for selection to the Hall of Fame, a person must be deceased or have been separated, or retired from active military service for at least three years at the time of nomination. He must have served in a Ranger unit in combat or be a successful graduate of the U.S. Army Ranger School. A Ranger unit is defined as those Army units recognized in Ranger lineage or history. Achievement or service may be considered for individuals in a position in state or national government after the Ranger has departed the Armed Forces. Honorary induction may be conferred on individuals who have made extraordinary contributions to Ranger units, the Ranger foundation, or the Ranger community in general, but who do not meet the normal criteria of combat service with a Ranger unit or graduation from the U.S. Army Ranger School. They are a tremendous source of pride and inspiration to us all.

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

I was just elected as president of the association in Tacoma in June and wanted to take a few lines to introduce myself. I went to Vietnam in April of 1968 and immediately volunteered for E/50 Airborne Long Range Patrol. I served through the rest of 1968 and through most of January 1969 when I had my second very unfriendly encounter with an PG. My first run in with Rags made it difficult to sit for a few days but the second one totally blinded me. After spending almost all of 1969 in hospitals, I went home and worked as an X-ray darkroom technician for a while and as a computer programmer on NCR mainframe computers until I tired of 60-80 hour work weeks. Later, I managed an apartment complex with my wife until she died a few years ago. I joined the 75th Ranger Regiment Association Inc. in early 1992, as soon as I heard of its existence. I have been vice president for the last two years and have been heavily involved in the KA project. We are still coming up with new names and corrections after all of this time.
